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Active voice in most English sentences with action verbs, the subject performs actions marked with verbs. These examples show that the subject performs a verb action. Because the subject performs or acts on a verb in such a sentence, the sentence is said to be in active voice. Passive Sound One can change the normal word order of many active sentences (which have direct objects) so that the subject is no longer active, but, conversely, followed up by a verb - or passive. Notice in this example how the subject-verb relationship has changed. Because the subject is being acted upon (or passive), such a sentence is said in a passive voice. NOTE: Colorful parrots living in the rainforest cannot be turned into passive sounds because sentences have no direct objects. To change a sentence from active to passive, do the following: 1. Move the active sentence direct object to the subject slot of sentence 2. Place the subject of the active sentence into a phrase that begins with a preposition by 3. Add additional verb forms to the main verb and change the form of the main verb Because passive voice sentences always add words and change the recipient of normal actions from the direction of the action, they can make the reader work harder to understand the intended meaning. As the example below illustrates, sentences in active voice flow more smoothly and are easier to understand than the same sentences in passive sounds. It is generally better to use ACTIVE sound. To turn a passive voice sentence into an active voice sentence, simply reverse the steps shown above. 1. Move the passive sentence subject to the active sentence direct object slot 2. Remove additional verbs coming from the main verb and change the form of the main verb if needed 3. Place the passive sentence object from the preposition by going into the subject slot. Because it's more direct, most writers prefer to use active voice if possible. Passive sound may be a better option, however, when an action player is unknown, unwanted, or unnecessary in a sentence Example author wants to emphasize a sentence action rather than an action player Example writer wants to use a passive voice for sentence variation. Passive sound is used when focusing on actions. However, it is not important or unknown, who or what performs the action. In the example above, the focus is on the fact that my bike was stolen. I don't know, however, who did it. Sometimes passive statements are more polite than active voices, as the following example shows: Example: Mistakes are made. In this case, I focus on the fact that mistakes are made, but I don't blame anyone (e.g. you've made a mistake.). Passive Personal and Impersonal Passive Personal means that the object of the active sentence becomes the subject of a passive sentence. So any verb that needs an object (transitive verb) can form a personal passive. Example: They built a house. – Houses are built. Objectless verbs (intransitive verbs) are usually unable to form personal passive sentences (because no object can be the subject of a passive sentence). If you want to use intransitive verbs in passive sounds, you need impersonal construction – therefore this passive is called Impersonal Passive. Example: he said - said Impersonal Passive is not common in English as in some other languages (e.g. German, Latin). In English, Impersonal Passive is only possible with perception verbs (e.g. say, think, know). Example: They say that women live longer than men. - It's said that women live longer than men. Although Impersonal Passive is possible here, Passive Private is more common. Example: They say that women live longer than men. - Women are said to live longer than men. The subject of the subordinate clause (female) goes into the beginning of the sentence; perception verbs are inserted into passive sounds. The rest of the sentences are added using an infinitive construction with 'to' (certain additional verbs and dropped).
